- The ISAM2014 Congress will be held jointly with the annual meetings of three domestic societies:
 - Japanese Society of Alcohol-Related Problems (JSARP)
 - Japanese Medical Society of Alcohol and Drug Studies (JMSAS)
 - Japanese Society for Neuroscience of Dependence (JSND)
- In principle, the ISAM Congress and the other three meetings will be held independently, but in parallel at the same venue.
- The close cooperation between the ISAM Congress and the Japanese society meetings is expected:
 - Joint symposia and workshops
 - Invitation of ISAM speakers to domestic meetings
 - Careful planning of meeting programs to increase the number of participants at both the ISAM and Japanese society meetings

- The program of the ISAM Congress will be developed in cooperation with the Asia-Pacific Society of Alcohol and Addiction Research (APSAAR).
- The ISAM2014 Congress will encourage ISAM affiliated societies and societies located in countries close to Japan to have joint programs at the Congress.


